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News Highlights

- The IMD's forecast of rain and thunderstorms across Tamil Nadu, Karnataka, and heavy rains in parts of Kerala could disrupt agriculture, impacting crop yields and market supply, especially for pulses, spices, coffee, and rubber.
- The vessel "M.V. BELFAST," carrying 28,095 of yellow peas from Canada, is expected to arrive at Mundra port on October 29, 2024, as reported by shipping agencies.
- In Karnataka, the standing tur crop remains healthy, with harvesting anticipated between November 20-25 in most regions, assuming favorable weather persists.
- Major Tur producing districts include Kalaburgi, Bidar, Raichur, Yadgiri, Vijayapura, and Bagalkot. While delayed flowering in Kalaburgi may push its harvest to early December, increased sowing in Bijapur and Kalaburgi (Jevargi, Afzalpur, Aland, Sedam) suggests a strong yield overall if weather conditions hold.
- As of October 25, 2024, Rabi chana sowing in Rajasthan has increased by 18% compared to the same period last year, according to the Rajasthan Agriculture Department.
- Global lentil markets saw slight price declines, influenced by slower exports and anticipation of Australia's harvest, primarily red lentils. The price drop has also impacted green lentils as consumers notice the price difference. This has led to expectations that ABARES' December 3 report may reveal a reduced harvest estimate, potentially supporting prices.
- The international chickpea market showed mixed results last week. Kabuli chickpeas remained stable, supported by low stocks in Mexico and smaller sizes in northern hemisphere harvests. Meanwhile, desi chickpeas saw price declines due to selling pressure from Australian farmers, driven by an expected production surge, potentially exceeding twice last year's 491,200 MT.
- International field pea prices dipped slightly as opportunities to sell to India narrow and competition rises. India's
 duty-free import window for yellow peas closes for shipments dated by December 31. While there's speculation
 on a possible extension or inclusion of green peas, strong local interest in rabi crop planting makes policy
 expansion politically challenging.
- Drier weather last week accelerated winter crop harvesting in Queensland and northern New South Wales in Australia, according to Queensland Country Life.
- Following significant rainfall in October, the outlook for chickpeas in Córdoba appears bright, according to the Bolsa de Cereales de Córdoba. A report from Argentina's Ministry of Agriculture forecasts a 114% year-over-year increase in chickpea production, reaching 66 KMT. This figure would mark a 30% rise above the historical average.
- The World Food Programme (WFP) has reported that Tanzania has suffered a loss of \$69 million in crops due to El Niño rains during the 2023-2024 agricultural season, with a total of 240,709 MT of crops affected.
- UK bean production has fallen by 37% over the past year due to wet weather and difficult spring conditions, with bean acreage decreasing from 208,154 hectares to 131,718 hectares, reports Fresh Produce Journal.

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
