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News Highlights

- Amid weak buying activity by dal mills, the domestic market experienced a decline in the prices of tur (pigeon pea) and urad (black gram), while the prices of chana (gram), masoor (lentil), and moong (green gram) remained largely stable.
- Urad prices have declined today due to weak demand from dal mills and falling prices of imported urad. Mills are
 limiting purchases to immediate needs, which may keep prices under slight pressure. However, adverse weather
 in Myanmar has raised concerns about crop productivity and quality, limiting a major price drop. Domestic urad
 arrivals remain steady, while South Indian millers are keeping an eye on crops in Madhya Pradesh and Uttar
 Pradesh.
- Tur (pigeon pea) prices have recorded a significant decline for the third consecutive trading session due to weak demand from dal mills. However, lemon tur prices in Chennai have remained stable in dollar terms. Increased arrivals of domestic tur in Karnataka markets and expected arrivals in Maharashtra later this month are adding to the pressure. Mills are purchasing only as needed, focusing on the upcoming new crop.
- Chana prices remain stable due to limited dal mill purchases, but demand persists as the consumption season continues and domestic stocks are low. Increased imports and lower future import prices are putting pressure on rates, though a major price drop is unlikely with new crops months away and delayed sowing in Karnataka.
- Although Australian chana forward deals are cheaper, a slight price increase of ₹250-300 per quintal may occur in the Delhi dal market before the goods arrive, so selling in haste is not advisable. While domestic chana forward deals are also lower, the likelihood of them reaching India before Makar Sankranti is low. Despite market pressure, experts highlight a shortage of domestic stock for the next two to three months, with delays in Australian chana shipments adding to the uncertainty.
- Masoor (lentil) prices in Delhi have remained stable, with limited daily arrivals in Madhya Pradesh and Uttar Pradesh markets. Despite good stock levels from last rabi season, a 45% decline in imports during the first half of the current financial year has kept prices steady. Strong demand from major consuming states like Bihar, Bengal, and Assam is expected to continue, ensuring that mills will need to buy masoor. Stockists are reluctant to sell at lower prices, making a significant price drop unlikely.
- Moong prices remain stable in producing mandis, with increased kharif sowing leading to higher production
 estimates. While arrivals continue, overall buying at the minimum support price (MSP) remains limited, preventing
 significant price increases. Experts suggest that prices will only improve if MSP-based buying picks up.
- In Gujarat, students from 32,277 government and aided primary schools will be provided with mid-day meals and daily snacks. As part of the initiative, 41 lakh government school students will receive breakfast daily, which will include items like Channa Chaat and mixed beans. The state government has allocated Rs 617 crore annually for the Mukhyamantri Poshit Snack Food Scheme to support this program.

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
