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News Highlights

- According to the India Meteorological Department (IMD), rainfall is likely to continue in the Western Himalayan region until January 23, and in the plains of Northwest India on January 22 and 23, 2025.
- Due to limited purchases by dal mills, the domestic market saw an improvement in the prices of urad, Tur, and chana. The trend for desi masoor remained mixed, while the prices of imported masoor stabilized. During this period, the prices of moong decreased in the Jalgaon market but remained stable in other markets.
- Due to increased demand from dal mills, the domestic market witnessed a rise in the prices of imported urad, while the prices of desi urad weakened during this period. In Chennai, the price of imported urad saw slight improvement in dollar terms. According to traders, reduced selling pressure at lower prices has led to some recovery in the prices of imported urad. However, traders believe that a significant price surge is unlikely at the moment. They expect a slight improvement in prices if mill purchases continue.
- The prices of tur imported from African countries remained stable for the second consecutive day. Meanwhile, in Chennai, the prices of imported lemon variety tur showed a slight improvement in dollar terms. According to traders, a minor price recovery in tur is possible, but a significant surge is unlikely at the moment. Currently, dal millers are purchasing tur only as per their immediate requirements, as the arrival of desi tur remains steady in key producing states like Karnataka and Maharashtra.
- The central government has extended the duty-free import period for tur until March 31, 2026. Previously, this period was set to end on March 31, 2025. Meanwhile, the initial arrivals of new lemon tur from Myanmar have begun.
- The domestic stock of high-quality desi chana is minimal, with most of the available stock being of lower quality. While prices may see slight improvement, a significant surge is unlikely due to steady shipments from Australia. Dal millers are purchasing only as needed, and although rabi season chana sowing has increased, the new crop is yet to arrive.
- Moong prices are stable in most producer markets, though they weakened in Jalgaon. Increased kharif
 sowing has led to higher production estimates, with steady arrivals in markets. In Delhi, Rajasthan's
 moong supply is affecting demand from Uttar Pradesh and Madhya Pradesh. While MSP procurement is
 happening across several states, it remains limited compared to total arrivals. Moong prices in most
 markets are below MSP, and NAFED's procurement is relatively low.
- Vessel "M.V.ULTRA YORKSHIRE" carrying 35,066.560 MT of Desi Chickpeas (Chana) from Australia is expected to arrive at Mundra port on January 25, 2025, according to shipping agency reports.
- Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada has released its initial supply and demand projections for the 2025/26 marketing year on January 20. Meanwhile, Statistics Canada is set to publish its first planting projections for the 2025/26 crop on March 12.

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
