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News Highlights

- Heavy to extremely heavy rainfall is likely over parts of Rajasthan, Uttarakhand, Kerala, and West Madhya Pradesh. Widespread moderate rains with thunderstorms are expected across Northwest, Central, South Peninsular, and Northeast India over the next 5–7 days, with strong winds in the South and rising rainfall activity in Odisha, West Bengal, and Konkan regions.
- Despite an 11% monsoon surplus in the first half of July, moisture deficits persist in key regions. Rainfall was 30% below normal in the east/northeast and 22.6% below in the south. These deficits have slowed kharif sowing, though overall seeding remains robust, according to IMD
- As per Nafed's auction results dated 16 July 2025, moong (K-24) fetched prices ranging from ₹6715—₹6831/qtl in Rajasthan, ₹6373/qtl in Karnataka, and ₹5640/qtl in Telangana. Meanwhile, masoor (K-24) auctioned in Madhya Pradesh was traded between ₹6206—₹6325/qtl.
- India's urad imports increased by 16% in April–May 2025, reaching 0.155 million MT compared to 0.133 million MT in the same period last year. Myanmar remained the largest supplier with 0.138 million MT, followed by Brazil (12,385 MT), reflecting a continued dependence on imports to meet domestic demand.
- India's tur imports surged by 54% during April—May 2025, totaling 0.188 million MT, compared to 0.122 million MT in the same period last year. Major import sources included Myanmar (84,300 MT), Mozambique (80,546 MT), and Tanzania (7,866 MT), reflecting increased reliance on overseas supplies.
- India's chana imports declined by 37% in April—May 2025, totaling 18,944 MT compared to 29,948 MT in the same period of 2024. The drop was mainly due to reduced shipments from Australia, which supplied 16,265 MT, down significantly from last year's volumes.
- India's yellow pea imports plunged 78% in April—May 2025, totaling 0.154 million MT compared to 0.686 million MT in the same period last year. The decline is attributed to lower shipments from major suppliers like Canada and Russia, although Argentina emerged as a notable contributor with 26,261 MT in May.
- India's masoor imports rose 28% to 0.145 million MT during April—May 2025, up from 0.113 million MT in the same period last year. Australia remained the largest supplier with over 79,000 MT, followed by Canada and the USA. The surge reflects strong import demand amid tight domestic availability.
- Lentil crops in South Australia are delayed by 4–6 weeks due to late rains, but a good spring could boost yields. NSW chickpeas need rain, though border areas with Queensland are doing well. Upcoming rains (15–50 mm) may aid dry regions like the Mallee in SA and Victoria.
- Lentil yields in Canada are under pressure due to persistent dry, hot weather, with 83% of prairie farmland facing drought. Early July storms caused significant crop losses, damaging lentils and peas in Alberta and Saskatchewan, and peas and edible beans in Manitoba.
- Severe drought in central and southeastern Turkey has halted harvest activities, with 2025 described as a disaster year by the Turkey Agricultural Chambers Union. Reported yield losses reach up to 85%, and lentils are among the affected crops, though the extent of damage remains uncertain.

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
