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News Highlights

- *The IMD has forecast dense to very dense fog across large parts of north, central and eastern India over the next two days, with cold day conditions likely in West Madhya Pradesh and squally weather over the Bay of Bengal near Sri Lanka. Meanwhile, air quality in Delhi-NCR remains very poor, with the AQI recorded at 310 on Monday evening.*
- *India's 2025 Rabi pulses sowing stood at 25.23 million hectares as on January 2, about 3% higher than the same period last year. Higher acreage under chana and masoor supported the overall increase, while sowing of moong, urad and kulthi remained lower on a year-on-year basis.*
- *Gujarat's Rabi pulses sowing during the 2025-26 season stood at 0.90 lakh hectares as on January 5, 2026, about 3% higher than last year. Higher acreage under gram supported the overall increase, though sowing of other pulses declined compared with the previous season.*
- *The vessel MV DARYA KOSHI, carrying about 32,941 MT of Australian desi chana, is scheduled to arrive at Mundra Port on 13 January 2026, as per shipping agency reports.*
- *Urad prices are expected to remain elevated due to slow arrivals from Brazil, higher CNF rates from Myanmar, a weak rupee and limited selling. Firm festival demand ahead of Pongal and Sankranti, along with stronger mill buying, tight import supply and lower domestic arrivals, continues to support the market, while slower Rabi sowing adds to bullish sentiment.*
- *Tur prices are likely to remain firm to higher, supported by lower-than-expected new-crop arrivals, limited imports from Myanmar, and expectations of MSP procurement. Seasonal demand, a weak rupee, higher import costs and cautious selling by mills and stockists continue to underpin prices across desi, African and Lemon tur, while the dal market remains strong in line with higher raw tur values.*
- *Chana prices are expected to remain range bound to firm, supported by mild festive demand, better mill buying and low mandi arrivals. However, steady Australian arrivals, higher sowing and favourable crop conditions are likely to cap further upside, with selling emerging on any sharp price rise.*
- *China has purchased at least 8 million MT of U.S. soybeans in 2025, sustaining buying momentum since October and helping meet commitments under the trade truce with Washington. While easing tariffs and lifting import bans supported U.S. shipments, China continues to diversify supplies by booking large volumes from Brazil and Argentina.*

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
