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News Highlights

- North India is in the grip of a severe cold wave as an active Western Disturbance brings falling temperatures, dense fog, and widespread rain and snowfall across the region. Heavy snowfall in Jammu & Kashmir, with more systems lined up, is expected to intensify cold conditions, disrupt visibility, and impact transport, particularly in the Kashmir Valley and higher reaches.
- Kazakhstan is looking to reduce its heavy dependence on wheat by developing a “lentil belt” in its northern regions, where agro-climatic conditions are favorable for pulse cultivation. Scientists say lentils offer strong agronomic and economic benefits, including soil improvement and higher profitability, but stress that success will depend on locally adapted technologies, robust research support, and close coordination between farmers and scientific institutions.
- India and Myanmar reaffirmed strengthening agri-trade ties at the South Asia Agri Forum in Yangon, with India highlighting Myanmar’s role as a reliable supplier of urad and tur pulses. Bilateral trade has expanded sharply to USD 2.1 billion in 2024–25, supported by a long-term pact ensuring steady pulse imports and stable market access for Myanmar farmers.
- The Centre has approved procurement of about 0.11 million MT of chana at an MSP of ₹5,875 per quintal for the 2026–27 Rabi season in Karnataka to support farmers amid higher sowing. National chana acreage has risen 5% to 9.59 million hectares, led by Rajasthan, Madhya Pradesh, and Karnataka, while Maharashtra has seen a decline.
- Chana imports rose sharply to 1.33 million MT during Jan–Nov 2025, compared with about 0.28 million MT in the same period last year. Australia dominated supplies with around 1.12 million MT, followed by Tanzania at 0.12 million MT, while smaller volumes came from Burma and other origins, highlighting a strong rebound in import demand.
- Global Weather - An Arctic cold blast is set to sweep across large parts of the US, with some crop areas lacking snow cover while snowfall in the Southern Plains may offer limited protection and ice disrupts logistics. Meanwhile, hot and dry weather in Argentina and southern Brazil is being closely watched as crops move through critical growth stages.

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
