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News Highlights

- According to the India Meteorological Department (IMD), light to moderate rain and snowfall are expected over Jammu & Kashmir, Himachal Pradesh, and Uttarakhand during 10–16 March, with thunderstorms in parts of North and East India. Heat-wave conditions are also likely in isolated areas of Gujarat, North Konkan, West Rajasthan, and Vidarbha during 10–12 March.
- According to shipping agency reports, the vessel MV. NORSE OZUKUMA carrying around 28,000 MT of lentils (Masoor) from Australia is scheduled to arrive at Kandla Port on 12 March 2026. This arrival is expected to add to the domestic availability of imported masoor.
- According to the Ministry of Agriculture & Farmers Welfare India Second Advance Estimates for 2025–26, Tur production is projected 5% lower at 3.45 million MT, while Urad output may decline 9.5% to 1.71 million MT. In contrast, Chana production is estimated 6% higher at 11.79 million MT and Masoor 5% higher at 1.73 million MT compared with last year.
- According to Directorate of Economics and Statistics India (DES) second advance estimates, India's Tur production is estimated to decline by about 5% to 3.45 million MT in Kharif 2025-26, compared with 3.62 million MT last year. Major declines are reported in Maharashtra, Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh, and Telangana, while Uttar Pradesh and Gujarat show marginal increases.
- According to the Directorate of Economics and Statistics India second advance estimates, Rabi chana production for 2025–26 is estimated at 11.79 million MT, up from 11.11 million MT last year, indicating about a 6% increase. Higher output is mainly seen in Maharashtra, Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan, and Gujarat, while declines are reported in Karnataka, Chhattisgarh, and Telangana.
- India exports a large share of its Kabuli chana (white chickpeas) to Gulf countries, with exports having doubled in the last two years—mainly to Iran, the UAE, and Turkey. However, ongoing geopolitical tensions and conflicts in the region are disrupting trade and payments, posing risks to exports. If the situation continues, both Indian traders and farmers may face significant challenges due to reduced demand.
- Global weather conditions remain mostly favourable for crops. Some dryness continues across the U.S. Plains, while conditions in Brazil largely support soybean and safrinha, despite pockets of dryness in southern areas. In the Black Sea region, cold weather has delayed early spring fieldwork in Ukraine, though overall weather risks to global production remain limited for now.

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
