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News Highlights

- India is witnessing highly contrasting weather conditions, with heavy rainfall, thunderstorms, hailstorms, and strong winds affecting several regions, while heatwave conditions continue across parts of north, central, and western India. The IMD has warned of potential crop damage, flooding, and disruptions due to severe weather activity, even as temperatures in some areas remain above 45°C.
- Today Market: Pulse markets witnessed mixed trends today. Tur prices declined in Akola (-₹50) and Chennai (-₹25), while Chana weakened by ₹25/quintal across Delhi, Raipur, and Bikaner. Urad remained firm with gains of ₹50-100/quintal in Chennai, Delhi, and Guntur, while Moong showed mixed movement. Masoor eased in Katni and Kolkata, whereas Kabuli Chana strengthened by ₹100/quintal in Indore, reflecting selective demand support.
- Delayed and deficient monsoon rains have slowed kharif pulses sowing, with total acreage down 43% as of June 12. Tur sowing is lower by 57%, moong by 55%, and urad by 22% compared to last year, as farmers in key producing states such as Karnataka and Maharashtra await adequate rainfall. While concerns over El Niño and further delays persist, the government's sizeable pulse buffer stock is expected to help contain price volatility.
- India's urad imports declined 22% year-on-year to 0.255 million MT during January-April 2026, compared with 0.327 million MT in the same period last year. The lower import volume reflects reduced overseas purchases and evolving domestic supply-demand conditions.
- Canadian lentil exports declined 15% month-on-month in April to about 0.215 million MT, with India and Turkey emerging as the largest buyers at around 69,000 MT each. Despite the monthly slowdown, cumulative exports for the marketing year reached 1.8 million MT, up from 1.6 million MT during the same period last year, reflecting strong overall demand.
- Canada exported about 26,700 MT (0.027 million MT) of chickpeas in April, down slightly by 1,200 MT from March. Pakistan was the largest buyer, importing around 10,300 MT. Cumulative chickpea exports for the marketing year reached 194,000 MT (0.194 million MT), running 27% higher than the same period in 2024-25, indicating strong international demand for Canadian chickpeas.
- Canadian pea exports rose 11% month-on-month to about 0.379 million MT in April. Cumulative exports for the 2025-26 marketing year reached 2.2 million MT, surpassing the nearly 2.0 million MT shipped during the same period last year. China was the largest buyer in April, accounting for 65% of exports, while India remains the top destination for the season with imports of 0.72 million MT through April.
- Australia's weather bureau has confirmed the onset of El Niño, with forecasts indicating it could become one of the strongest events since 1950. The phenomenon is expected to bring hotter and drier conditions across Asia and Australia, potentially impacting crop production and raising concerns over global food supplies.
